Pour it, Paint it and Lift it Materials

This course involves intuitive and spontaneous painting processes. As a result, choices of materials may vary and evolve as you paint. This list of materials is simply a suggestion listing paints and supplies that are helpful to have on hand while working. I may not use all these pigments in the course demonstrations, and you are not required to purchase specific paints for this course. I encourage you to experiment with your own color choices, but if you'd like to know what I'm working with, the list below contains many of the pigments I rely on.

*There are four pigments by Holbein that I use repeatedly and are essential when doing the matte medium lift out or when I want to mix an opaque at other times. Although they are watercolor, they are extremely opaque.

Paper

• For this Painting Technique, I encourage Students to use Full Sheets of Hot Pressed watercolor paper. I prefer the 140 lb. paper because the paint doesn't sink in as much. Please work on full sheets, and use a board cut one inch larger all around to use as your paper support. In other words, the dimensions should be at least 24 x 32 inches. This can be Gator Board or a lightweight wooden plywood or similar board.

Paints

It is important to have a variety of Transparent, Semi-Transparent and Opaque paints. Here are some colors that are helpful to have available in **bold print** you can bring your own favorite colors to work with as well:

- Cadmium Yellow Deep or Marigold Yellow or similar
- New Gamboge
- Lemon Yellow (or Cadmium Yellow Light) or Hansa Yellow Lt
- Dioxizine Violet
- Cobalt Violet (red shade of Violet)
- Permanent Rose
- Cobalt Blue or Primary Blue

- Cerulean Blue (great for mixing warm grays too!)
- Ultramarine Blue
- Indigo
- Manganese Blue(Optional)
- Phthalo Blue
- Pthalo Green
- Hookers Green or Viridian
- Sap Green
- •Cad Red Lt or Scarlet
- Alizarin Crimson
- Cad Red Deep, Pyrole or Napthol Red
- Titanium White Gouache Optional Colors
- Permanent Rose, Quinacradone Rose or Opera Pink* (I personally LOVE this Opera Pink!)
- Holbein's Shell Pink* and Holbein's Peacock Blue
- Thalo Yellow Green
- Holbein's Lilac*

POURING CUPS – Please bring 5 – 7 Plastic Beverage Cups to mix paint in and use to POUR

Brushes

- Variety of Rounds: #2, #4, #6, #10 #12
- 3/4" Angled Brush

• Variety of Flats: 3", 2" and 1" (synthetic) and important brushes to have. • Large Foam or Acrylic Brush for applying Matte Medium

Materials

- Paper Towels
- Acrylic Liquid Matte Medium and container for mixing with water (one that can hold a cup)
- Tissues (for lifting out color if necessary) Kleenex is best because it is sturdier.

- Two Containers filled with water. One for Clean water, one for Dirty
- Wax Paper
- Artist's Tape Drafting Tape in a couple widths
- 2 B Pencil & Kneaded Eraser
- Carved Linoleum Stamps
- Masking Fluid and Making Lifting Eraser

• Stencils, (Shapes, Textures, Patterns, Numbers and Letters) Photo References and other sources for creating unique shapes.

- Toothbrush or Spatter Screen
- Spray bottle (one that creates droplets

• Stamps! Several Stamps and sizes. If you can make/carve a couple of your own, that is the BEST – you literally put your unique Stamp on your work. You can buy the Speedy Carve carving block from Speedball that makes carving a lot easier.

• Palette - I'll be using both a John Pike palette and a butcher tray, but you can use anything with a large mixing area.
